1) tutoring, supplemental instruction, and enriched educational service	1) providing wraparound services (which could be provided in collaboration with and/or through contracts with community-based organizations, and could include academic supports, trauma-informed care, social-emotional support, and mental health services)
2) expedited evaluations of the strengths and needs of homeless children and youths,	
3) Professional development and other activities for educators and specialized instructional support personnel that are designed to heighten the understanding and sensitivity	2) purchasing needed supplies (e.g., PPE, eyeglasses, school supplies, personal care items)
4) Referral services to homeless children and youths for medical, dental, mental, and other health services.	
5) assistance to defray the excess cost of transportation	3) providing transportation to enable children and youth to attend classes and participate fully in school activities
6) developmentally appropriate early childhood education programs, not otherwise provided through Federal, State, or local funding, for preschool-aged homeless children	
7) services and assistance to attract, engage, and retain homeless children and youths, particularly homeless children and youths who are not enrolled in school	4) purchasing cell phones or other technological devices for unaccompanied youth to enable the youth to attend and fully participate in school activities;
8) before- and after-school, mentoring, and summer programs	
9) the payment of fees and other costs associated with tracking, obtaining, and transferring records necessary to enroll homeless children and youths in school	5) Providing access to reliable, high-speed internet for students through the purchase of internet-connected devices/equipment, mobile hotspots, wireless service plans, or installation of Community Wi-Fi Hotspots (e.g., at homeless shelters), especially in underserved communities.
10) education and training to the parents and guardians of homeless children and youths about the rights of, and resources available	
11) development of coordination between schools and agencies providing services to homeless children and youths	6) Pay for short-term, temporary housing (e.g., a few days in a motel) when such emergency housing is the only reasonable option for COVID-safe temporary housing and when necessary to enable the homeless child or youth to attend school and participate fully in school activities (including summer school).
12) provision of specialized instructional support services (including violence prevention counseling) and referrals for such services	
13) Activities to address the particular needs of homeless children and youths that may arise from domestic violence and parental mental health or substance abuse problems.	7) Store cards/prepaid debit cards to purchase materials necessary for students to participate in school activities.
14) The adaptation of space and purchase of supplies for any non-school facilities	
15) The provision of school supplies, including those supplies to be distributed at shelters or temporary housing facilities, or other appropriate locations.	
16) other extraordinary or emergency assistance needed to enable homeless children and youths to attend school and participate fully in school activities
